Executive Committee Message



Although it was many years ago, I still remember looking forward to the day after Labor Day. It was always the first day of school. Today, children return to school as early as the middle of August. Returning after the summer break brings a lot of baggage and more apprehension than ever before.

In the *good old days*, parents watched as their children mostly walked to school since there was no bus service. Older parents gave a sigh of relief as their first time college student left for the adventure of a lifetime. How different things are today!

What began as a normal school day at the Apalachee High School in Winder, Georgia turned into another scene of mass shootings. Can you image, a 14-year-old student had an assault rifle? At another part of the school, the kids sat in quiet and in darkness. They had been trained for this and knew how to stay quiet. They did not know that their city of Winder, Georgia, was about to become the site of the worst mass shooting in a school this year. The father of the 14-year-old shooter was charged with four counts of involuntary manslaughter, two counts of second degree murder and eight counts of cruelty to children. The son has been charged with four counts of murder and will be prosecuted as an adult. Two teachers were dead, and two students were dead. Nine others were injured.

A 15-year-old was shot and killed in Joppa, Maryland in the high school bathroom. A 16-year-old is in custody. This happened on the very first day of school. Another child with a gun and desire to murder. One person was arrested but no further information is available at this time.

This is a story of what happens when you send your child to grade school. What about those who are sending their children to college? Here in Pittsburgh, two Jewish students were attacked at the University of Pittsburgh. The students were hit by a glass bottle, both of whom were wearing kipot. One was hit in the neck, the other on the cheek. The suspect was wearing a kaffiyeh, a traditional checkered scarf worn in the Middle East, that is increasingly a symbol of solidarity with Palestinians.

Pennsylvania Governor, Josh Shapiro said "antisemitism and hate-fueled violence have no place in this community."

Anti-semitism has been on the rise since October 7, when Hamas terrorists invaded Israel and killed approximately 12,000. More than 240 others were taken hostage.

It is a shame that Jewish students report feeling uncomfortable with other students knowing that they are Jewish. They feel that they cannot speak about antisemitism, nor how they feel about Israel.

The role of parents in a student's life stretches from the early years of growth to preparation for higher education. I don't think though, that this preparation included worrying that your elementary student will make it home safely from school every day, or that your college student will become an object of anti-semitism or be put down because of his/her thoughts on Israel. It is a challenging world to say the least. I have two grandchildren in college, and I worry about them every day.

This Yom Kippur let us pray and reflect on how we can make the world a better and safer place for all.

Rabbi's Message





In English, we often refer to Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur collectively as the High Holidays. While the use of the word high gives a sense that these days are elevated over all others, the English word holiday (despite its derivation from holy+day) has a more joyous and celebratory feel than is really intended for this Season of Repentance. In this regard, the Hebrew Yamim Nora'im (Days of Awe) captures the sense of these sacred occasions more thoroughly. We seek to capture the overwhelming sense of reverence and respect (with perhaps a dose of fear) that our ancestors felt when they encountered God at Sinai, and that is reflected in the Hebrew word *nora*.

As I have mentioned before, the fact that we stand together on these most sacred days is vital. None of us is Moses, who could speak *panim el-panim* (face-to-face) with God. Like the Israelites assembled at the base of the mountain, we need each other in order to fully embrace the occasion—to avail ourselves of the opportunity to stand in God's presence, to have the strength to endure God's judgement, to know that we are not alone as we face the chaos within ourselves and in our world.

This year, these Days of Awe will take on a particular resonance as we examine the events of the past year. The horrifying October 7 attacks still hang over us, and the anniversary and its attendant commemorations overlap with our holy day observances. Our martyrology service on Yom Kippur and Yizkor services on Yom Kippur and Sh'mini Atzeret will underscore the impact of the attacks and their victims on us and our community. The words of Unetaneh Tokef, when we consider our fate in the coming year with all of its attendant uncertainty, will land differently than in past years (and even differently than it did a few years ago during the pandemic). It's a lot to process and consider while not collapsing under the burden.

In a traditional synagogue, the leader fully prostrates during the Aleinu Gadol, the "Great Aleinu" recited during the shofar service on Rosh Hashanah and also on Yom Kippur. The *gabba'im* (bima assistants) are then charged with lifting the leader back to their feet. Even for the experienced, singing while prostrating and then rising requires assistance. So too for all of us. As we enter into the new year of 5785, we will sit in our historic sanctuary, stand before God, and bow in turns. Each of us will carry out these actions as we best can. But none of us is alone. We all will have shoulders to lean on, and even to cry on, when that is necessary. So I have an invitation and a charge to all of us. The invitation is to ask for help and support when it is needed, despite the difficulty so many of us feel in asking for assistance. The charge is to be open to those requests and to be the support that those around us need

In the Hebrew letters, 5785 is tav-shin-peh-heh. With a little linguistic manipulation, we can draw from this the verb "to put" and the word "here." In this year, let us put ourselves here, where we are, with our community. Let us face the uncertainty together, support each other in sad times, and celebrate together in times of joy.

L'shanah tovah tikateivu—may you all be inscribed for a good new year!

Question: Why is the actual mitzvah (commandment) regarding the shofar a little strange?

Answer: Almost all of the *mitzvot* for which we say a blessing beforehand are those for which we perform the requisite action. God commanded us to shake the *lulav* on Sukkot, light Shabbat candles, and affix *mezuzot* to our doorposts (see last month's column), for example. We recite the blessing acknowledging the commandment and then perform the action (lighting Shabbat candles is done before the blessing, though, because once the blessing is recited one cannot kindle the flame). However, for the shofar the commandment is actually to hear the sound, not to blow the shofar. While this is reflected in the blessing, it is still not an action we take. We recite the blessing, but are then dependent on someone else carrying out the action of blowing the shofar so that we can hear it. I think part of the significance is that the Hebrew *lishmo'a* (to hear) can also mean to listen. While someone else blows the shofar, our role is not passive. We must hear the sound and consider what it calls us to do.

To succeed in our quest, we must Lower our guard against imagined enemies Discard the armor of tired assumptions And move beyond the debris of familiar stories


Even if we have traveled here before Let this journey take us on a new path Let us be willing to be surprised As we welcome the souls of our ancestors
